Did you know a “[Nexus Letter](#) is usually required to grant a secondary disability? Although the [nexus letter](#) will not need to prove the condition is from your military service, it will need to prove the secondary condition is caused or aggravated by the current [service-connected disability](#). These letters are most often needed from medical professionals to show the connection between the primary and secondary diagnosis”.

Did you know there are two VA organizations? The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) which provide healthcare through their medical centers and/or civilian doctors, and the Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA), which reviews, awards disability ratings and compensation based on your applications. You can apply online for a disability review and award and/or get assistance from the Veteran Service Organizations (VSO).

If you are a veteran who has been denied disability benefits, you may want to consider submitting a VA stressor letter. This type of letter can be a powerful tool in supporting your claim for disability benefits. A stressor letter is a statement written by the veteran outlining the stressful events they experienced during their service, which may have contributed to their current condition. This letter can help to establish a clear link between the veteran's service and their current disability, which can be crucial in determining their eligibility for benefits. Without a stressor letter, it can be difficult to prove that the veteran's disability is service-related, which may result in a denial of benefits. Therefore, if you are a veteran seeking disability benefits, it is important to understand the importance of a VA stressor letter and to consider submitting one as part of your claim.

- **The inquiry stage:** You submit your application to the Department of Veterans Affairs.

- **Evidence Gathering:** During this stage the right sources are being gathered and any essential proof will be determined.
- **An Examination of the Evidence:** The VA has been given all the relevant evidence and is now reviewing it.
- **Decision-making Preparation:** The VA has reached a final determination & are working on documentation to explain it.
- **A Final Decision:** An official decision has been made by the Veterans Affairs Representative.
- **Notification preparations:** For mailing purposes, the VA is putting together notification concerning your decision.
- **Completion stage:** You will be given the verdict in the mail

Did you know the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services has released a report which highlights the dangers of Trichloroethylene (TCE) faced by veterans stationed on U.S. military installations? The report officially lists TCE as a human carcinogen, which is a primary pollutant at Camp Lejeune and other military installations. It has been found that TCE is a primary driver for exposure-related acute leukemia. This announcement is significant as it brings attention to the dangerous working conditions faced by veterans and active duty service members on military installations and the importance of implementing safety measures to prevent further exposure.

Did you know the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) provides compensation for a variety of dental issues that veterans may experience? Unfortunately, many veterans have this condition and are not aware of it. Veterans who are experiencing dental issues related to their service may be eligible for compensation for this condition. Additionally, you must meet certain eligibility criteria based on your service-connected disability or income level. The VA also offers extended care for veterans who require vision rehabilitation and low vision services.

Did you know the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) announced recently that it will conduct a scientific review to determine whether there is a relationship between three conditions; acute leukemias, chronic leukemias, and multiple myeloma outside of the head and neck and toxic exposures for service members who deployed to Iraq, Afghanistan, Somalia, Djibouti, Egypt, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, Yemen, Uzbekistan, and the entire Southwest Asia theater of operations?
